Instructions

Nominee candidates must be nominated by a member of their dissertation committee (faculty advisor).

Five *Questions of Interest* about your proposal are presented on the pages that follow. Please craft your responses to address a standard-setting audience (as opposed to an academic audience). Your complete response to all five questions, in total, should not exceed 1000 words.

After completing the Questions of Interest, please provide your faculty advisor with a single file to upload with your nomination, as well as a second file containing your CV.

By making your submission, you agree that if you are selected and accept the award, FASB may publicize the award to you (including details from your professional biography) in its publications and on its website. Publicity of awards is an essential component of FASB's mission to promote greater understanding of accounting standard-setting. In addition, if you are selected to receive the award, you must submit a Form W-9 to the Financial Accounting Foundation as a condition to receiving the award.



1. Which project(s) on the FASB's [technical and research](#) or [post-implementation review](#) agendas does your dissertation pertain to? If your dissertation does not pertain to any current projects, please describe the relevance of your dissertation to standard-setting activities more broadly.


2. What primary research questions do you plan to address in your dissertation?

3. What are your predictions, and what are the primary conclusions you believe the FASB will be able to draw if you find support for these predictions?

4. How does your dissertation fit in with any related academic literature?

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5. What is the primary methodology you plan to employ in your dissertation (archival analysis, theoretical modeling, experimentation) and what key details of your research design will be important to interpreting your results and understanding any limitations? For example, what period will the results cover, what types of firms will be included/excluded in the sample, what will be key features of the experimental design, etc.?

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
